








How to be a State Advocate

Rally Your Federation

- Start a grassroots campaign
- Send letters
- Make calls
- Schedule one-on-one meetings
- Find possible coalition partners
- Be the source for legislators





- Keep it brief
- Identify NARFE and yourself
- Quickly introduce your concern
- Succinctly explain issue
- Reiterate

Why State Advocacy Is Important

While much of NARFE's advocacy efforts are focused on federal issues, individual states provide an additional playing field for NARFE members to fight for their retirement security. NARFE members can take action on a host of issues, including those surrounding taxes, long-term care insurance, health care and much more. This toolkit is meant to guide NARFE federations as they create and carry out state-level advocacy. Use the resources in this toolkit to construct and maintain an effective state-level advocacy program.

Roles and Responsibilities of a State Legislative Chair

Each federation should have a State Legislative Chair to provide leadership for their federation's state-level advocacy efforts. State Legislative Chairs serve as the liaison between NARFE members, federation leadership, elected state officials and NARFE's Advocacy Department.








Davis v. Michigan

A state may not grant total exemptions from state income taxation to state government pensioners, unless it grants the same exemptions to federal government pensioners.
