NCDHHS: Disaster Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Application Period Extended in Five Western North Carolina Counties

"PRESS RELEASE — The North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services is announcing a one-day extension for people in Alexander, Buncombe, Haywood, Macon and McDowell counties through Friday, October 25 to apply for benefits through the Disaster Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program to help them buy food for their families. The U.S. Department of Agriculture approved the extension following feedback from the counties that requested the one-day extension for in-person applications. As of Wednesday, more than 105,000 individuals had been approved to receive D-SNAP benefits.

Those who pre-registered for D-SNAP in any of the 25 counties through <u>ePASS.nc.gov</u> by 4 p.m. on Oct. 24, 2024, but were unable to reach the call center to complete their interview, will receive a call from DSS officials by Nov. 1 to complete their application. NCDHHS asks those who have pre-registered to anticipate a call between now and Nov. 1 at the phone number they provided in the pre-registration application. The number calling may be from outside their local area code.

REMINDER — **FEMA Individual Assistance**.

- FEMA Individual Assistance is available to everyone in the disaster declared counties
 (generally west of I-77 plus Nash and Lee), and EVERYONE SHOULD APPLY to see if they
 are eligible for assistance. The number of registrations may determine access to future
 federal, state, local, and voluntary disaster recovery and resilience support at the
 individual and community levels.
- 2. <u>Legal Aid of NC and Pisgah Legal</u> offer disaster legal services programs to assist with applications and appeals to FEMA, for homeowners and rentals dealing with damage and displacement, and for fraud support.

GRANTS FOR ORGANIZATIONS — For impacted and responding organizations.

- Golden LEAF "is making resources available to organizations to support immediate relief
 for individuals and families including home repair, addressing unmet needs, and helping
 transition out of FEMA supported housing programs. Governmental entities and 501(c)(3)
 charitable nonprofits are eligible to apply." https://goldenleaf.org/helene-relief/
- 2. The North Carolina Disaster Relief Fund, administered by United Way of North Carolina. "... will help provide for immediate unmet needs through reimbursements to nonprofits working with disaster survivors. For immediate, unmet needs, the United Way of North Carolina will provide grants to nonprofits or reimburse nonprofits working in

impacted communities... Certain nonprofit organizations assisting individuals and communities recovering from Hurricane Helene are eligible for funding. Eligible groups include any 501(c)(3) agency with a valid charitable solicitation license that is assisting Hurricane Helene-impacted communities with immediate needs."
